## Human Resources

- Vacant Positions
  - Fire Department
    - Two Lieutenants
    - One Fire Engineer

## Public Works

- Projects:
  - The contractor for the LC-17 project is working on completing the work on El Verde Street, finishing creek slopes, grading the creek bottom, pouring concrete on channel # 2, working on punch list items on El Verde Street, completing the sewer tie in at Bandera Road, preparing to install the block wall in the creek bottom, and finishing the grading of channel # 1. The project's projected end date is now in July, due to the recent rains, with 30 days allotted for punch-list completion.
  - The City Engineer has finalized plans for the bio-swale to be installed at Raymond Rimkus Park Forest Meadow entrance. The project is being bid and work is to start right after the 4th of July event. Provisions will be made to keep the entrance open to the Community Gardeners.
  - The City Engineer has finalized the documents for the Grass Hill well plant generator. The bids were opened on June 11th and will now go to Council for approval.
  - The City Engineer is finalizing the Huebner at Balky crosswalk bid documents. The bids are ready to be advertised.
  - Staff and the City Engineer revised the MS4 Stormwater Plan and submitted it to the regulatory authorities.
  - Staff continues to meet with Waterworth software technicians to review water and sewer needs for capital planning purposes. We are in the process of creating an Infrastructure Capital Plan for the water and sewer system to be used for the next 20 years.
  - Staff is working on designs for the custom art proposed for the bus shelters at the library and the park.
  - Staff is working with CPS Energy and ChargePoint on a proposal to install electric vehicle charging stations at certain areas in the city. We expect to bring this idea to Council in July.
  - Staff is working on the procedures for citizens to apply for the new rain barrel and xeriscaping rebate program. The program will give a \$40 water bill credit to people who install rain barrels at their residences and \$100 credit for people who install at least 200 square feet of xeriscaping,

replacing the grass. The Plumbing Code is being revised to exempt rain barrels that are not connected to the City's water supply and are less than 400 gallons.

- The City won the Project of the Year award from the American Public Works Association for the Evers Road Bridge in the "projects over \$2 million and under \$5 million".
- Year 1 Street Maintenance Project is almost complete. The contractor is working in Shadow Mist and The Ridge at Leon Valley to complete the sidewalk repairs.
- The City Engineer has finalized the plans for the Blacksmith and Wagon Spoke water and sewer main replacement project, and bids have been advertised. This is part of a CDBG grant program.
- Staff is working on a cost sharing project with Bexar County to replace a portion of the water main, and then mill and overlay El Verde Road, once the LC-17 construction has been completed.
- Preparing to enhance the crosswalk on Evers in front of the library. Thermoplastic signs will be placed in the street in both directions, rumble strips will be installed, and signage will be placed farther away from the crosswalk.
- Shade structures for the large playground at Raymond Rimkus Park were delayed by the contractor but have finally arrived. They are being stored at Public Works until the contractor can perform the work to install them this work will be performed after the 4th of July event at the park.
- Constructing walking path at The Ridge at Leon Valley Park.
- Continuing to clean out tributary between William Rancher and Samaritan roads, weather permitting.
- Continuing construction on pavilion at The Ridge at Leon Valley Park.
- In the process of street sweeping entire city. They will come back and get any spots missed after the entire city is complete.
- Repairing sprinklers at City Hall.
- Preparing to take water samples.
- Creating water and sewer main replacement plan.
- Waiting on delivery of the new flatbed truck.
- Training
  - The Maintenance Crew Leader is studying to become a Certified Playground Inspector and a Certified Pool Operator next week.
  - Crew member will be taking Pest Control classes in order to obtain the license.
  - Continuing Education classes for the Water Crew will be on July 24 to the 26th at Shavano Park.

- Six officers joined with members of the Methodist Children's Hospital to raise \$1500 for the Rowan Wyndam Food Bank Cereal Drive.
- The members of the department set up and executed the third annual Junior Law Enforcement Competition. The competition enjoyed 18 teams of four from various schools and police explorer posts from throughout the region.
- Several members of the department continue to support South Texas Special Olympics as board members and event coordinators.
- Chief Salvaggio and Asst. Chief Saucedo continue to make meetings as board members of the Marshall Law and Medical Magnet School.

## Fire Department

- Fire Recovery USA Cost Recovery– The Fire department has received an incident recovery total collection in the amount of \$37,714.14 to date with 48 active runs, and 4 denials by insurance companies.
- **Emergicon (EMS)** The Emergicon collection was in the amount of **\$30,239.04** with 66 incident runs completed for the month of May 2019.
- Radio Command Center (training and implemented) We previously installed Computer Aided Dispatch Software (CAD) this allows Bexar County dispatch service and a regional software system to interface with our Emergency Management Services patient care program. The dispatch information displays on our computers mounted in our emergency vehicles providing information quickly to accompany the Bexar County Public Safety Communications Center radio transmission. Currently, we implemented a Radio Command Center within the fire station comprising of a large format computer monitor, keyboard, mouse, charging radio stations, and radios mounted on a joker stand. The purpose of this Radio Command Center pending 911 alerts to display on the large format computer monitor providing quick visual access while in the fire station, prior to receiving the 911 dispatch communication radio call. All of the following provides immediate, accurate, and reliable information for responding to emergency situations. Every second counts and providing the appropriate resources as quickly as possible may be the difference between life and death. (Note: Captain Morgan's father built and donated the "Joker Stand" housing the Radio Command Center with cabinets to remain organized and store our Emergency Vehicle Inventory Checklist binders. Fire Station Trivia "Joker Stand" In its heyday, the Joker Stand was the heartbeat of the Fire Department. All communications between the Fire Alarm Offices and the Firehouses were sent over this ingenious multi-function electrical system. Companies were dispatched on various grades of alarms, upgrades were transmitted, and company returns to quarters were part of this system for 94 years.)
- Leon Valley Firefighters rescue kittens trapped in pipe using shop vacuum! (community service) Leon Valley firefighters got creative Saturday as they worked to rescue newborn kittens trapped in a drainage hole at the vacant building adjacent to the Taco Bell. The manager reported there were trapped kittens to the nonemergency police line for assistance rescuing the trapped kittens. The Taco Bell employee has adopted the kittens and has named them Taco and Bell. - National Fallen Firefighters Foundation Certification (training)– Congratulations to Reuben Salas for his Certification of Completion of "Courage To Be Safe on the Fire Hero Learning Network". The National Fallen Firefighters Foundation offers a variety of training for the fire service including courses on community risk reduction, firefighter behavioral health, firefighter Local Assistance State Team (LODD) prevention, and LODD preparedness.
- **Career Day 2019 Leon Valley Elementary (community service)** Career Day is an annual tradition and comprised of several volunteers speaking about their career field. The students visited different classrooms and receive valuable insight regarding each career. The career volunteers this year consisted of a Leon Valley Firefighter, Leon Valley Police Officer, HEB employees, Airline employees (Flight Attendant, Administrative Support, Operations Agent, and Ground/Airport Station Attendant), SWAT,

Chefs, and a dentist. This program provides students with a dynamic and tangible experience that facilitates a connection between their academic pursuits and professional endeavors in the future. Additionally, Career Day provides a platform to develop meaningful connections between the students, teachers, alumni, parent, friends as well as career volunteers. Career Day is one way to encourage students to explore their interests and passion, better understand themselves, their community, and the world. Thank you to Leon Valley Elementary for the annual invitation. Thank you to all the volunteers from various businesses for your investment to our children's future! It Takes a Village! (*Thank you to LV Fire Dept. Hello Everyone! Once again, thank you for being part of our Career Day this year! Students and staff had a wonderful time. - **EMT Intravenous (IV) Therapy Training (training)** -The Leon Valley Fire Department is continuously training to improve our skills as well as to continue to learn. Today they assisted a new firefighter with the foundation for clinical practice EMT Intravenous (IV) Therapy training as a team. This consists of practicing the assessment, management of patients and successfully complete IV insertions with the goal of providing excellent service to our patients. Overall, demonstrating critical thinking skills, decision making skills, and assessment-based patient care.
- **Big Rig Petting Zoo (community service)** The Fire Department participated in the annual Big Rig Petting Zoo Monday June 10th at 10:30 am displaying our ambulance and fire truck as well as Sparky made his cheerful appearance. Additional vehicles consisted of the Tiger Sanitation truck, Police Department cars, Public Works vehicles, and the How to know to Go unit. This program allows families to get up close, touch, and explore vehicles and equipment located in the park area between the Library and Community Center. 801 attendees this year!
- Credit Systems International (EMS) CSI is our professional debt recovery solutions collections company. Emergicon transitions these delinquent accounts to CSI identified as primary bad debt accounts with balances over \$50.00 that are between 31 days and two years in age from the date of service. According to history businesses will only collect 20 to 60 percent of receivables once they are 90 to 120 days old. CSI has collected \$17,837.44 since June 2017 to date.
- Leon Valley Automobile Accident Extrication A vehicle was found upright with severe damage to the front of the vehicle after hitting a metal pole by the Bandera and El Verde traffic light. The patient was trapped in the vehicle requiring extrication from the vehicle and transported priority one to university hospital. No additional vehicles were involved.
- Leon Valley Fire Department High School Student Mentorship (training and community service) Maria Villafruenca who attends Marshall High School participates in the Independent Study Mentorship (ISM) program that allows students to find a mentor in any career field and have a year-long mentorship. We are extremely pleased Maria chose the Leon Valley Fire Department for her mentorship. Throughout the year the student experiences the work life of the career they chose. This course exposes students to career fields and prepares them for the real world. Additionally, mentoring provides the mentee validation, and inspiration to gather courage to pursue their goals and passion with a purpose and direction. Mentoring may also help foster relationships between incoming applicants, new recruits the goal is students become fire fighters or get involved in emergency response service.
  - Captain/Deputy Fire Marshal Burnside has been providing mentorship for Maria by way of her job shadowing his responsibilities, providing direct communication such as answering pertinent questions, relevant knowledge, wisdom, and experience related to her field of study. Further, she has learned about fire prevention, business fire permit procedures, fire inspections, and the many different parts that make a municipality functional. This has been a mutual opportunity exchange as Maria has provided an abundance of assistance to Captain Burnside and the fire station assisting with various projects.
